## **Financial Statement**

Members,

I am pleased to present you with this Annual Report and Fnancial Statement for the season 1968-69. I trust that you find the report embraces all aspects of Club life and that it presents to you an accurate record of the season's activities.

The very reason for our existence has again been successfully achieved, that being the saving of lives. It is very pleasing to once again be able to report that the season has progressed without loss of life. This is, of course the ultimated size of all such correspondings. the season has progressed without loss of life. This is, of course, the ultimate aim of all such organisations and it is indeed most gratifying to all concerned to think that a 100 per cent. record still exists in the Club since its inception. Let us hope that, whilst this beach is patrolled, we are able, by our "vigilance and service," to maintain this perfect record.

Many members, as I have often observed, would Many members, as I have often observed, would much rather be doing other things than looking after the safety of the many thousands of bathers who frequent our surf beach during the summer. However, members, just stop and think what you are doing for these thousands of people! You, by spending just a few hours of your spare time, once every five weeks approximately, are making it possible for these people to enjoy one of our healthiest and most relaxing of sports in perfect safety. This should be sufficient incentive for all of you to do your patrols to the best of your ability.

of your ability. Even though we can still boast of a clean record for lives saved, we should not overlook the fact that our overall efficiency still leaves a certain amount to be desired. This fact is clearly shown by the results of the inter-club patrol efficiency competition for the gear trailer. We could only rate a poor tenth place out of fourteen clubs in the Central Coast Branch. At first sight this appears appalling for a Club enjoying At first sight this appears appalling for a Club enjoying the general success that we do, and in fact I am sorry to say that it is. However, I feel I must enlighten you further as to this result. At the completion of the second round we were in fourth place and only a few points behind the second and third placed clubs. With a satisfactory third round we must have finished in a place expected of a club of our strength. This was not to be, thanks to the fact that some of our members are not as conversant with lifesaving principles as they should be, and we finished in this humiliating position.

This leads me immediately to patrol captains and vice-captains. I feel it is their responsibility to ensure that all members of their patrol are efficient in all phases of lifesaving. Further, I should add, that in most cases this is so. Let's see that in future this is the case with all patrols. If you are made a patrol captain or vice-patrol captain, then do the job expected of you and assist the Chief Instructor and Club Captain by relieving them of the need to teach your patrol members the things which they should know. PATROLS AND RESCUES

During this season we again had ten patrols, in which we had up to ten members. Our active membership at the end of the season, due to resignations and

suspensions, was just under one hundred.

The season did not see as many new members The season did not see as many new members joining the Club as in past seasons. This is unfortunate as the trend of the last number of seasons has been one of healthy increase in active members, thus a lightening of the individual's duties. We must strive to obtain new members for the Club so that our patrol numbers do not have to be decreased, nor do the number of patrols in a season have to be increased.

All members should endeavour to introduce any of their friends to the active membership list of the Club

Club.

This season has been quite a reduction in the incidence of rescue to that of last season. The rescues carried out during the season by patrol members whilst on active duty were:

CLUB ALTERATIONS AND EXTENSIONS

It is proposed to proceed with alterations and extensions to the present clubhouse in the near future. The need for these has arisen because of increased membership over the past few seasons. This natural growth has seen a greater demand for much more storage space for necessary equipment such as reels, beats boards skip etc.

There is also need for another office besides the Captain's office. This would free the Captain's office of much of its present traffic and the abundance of lost-and-found "junk" which finds its way in there.


COMPETITION

strations of the various forms of resuscitation were performed.


The Club was also fortunate to receive a full centre-page spread in the "Central Coast Express" at the beginning of last season to mark 40 years of surf patrols.





It is of interest to note that five past members of the Juvenile Club are now Bronze Medallion holders, and seven past members have their Qualifying Certificates. All are active Surf Club members.

This year we have eighteen 10 and 11 year olds, and these boys will be going into the Senior Club in the next two or three years. If these lads are to be proficient and useful senior members it will be necessary for the Senior Club to take a more active interest in their training than was the case during the year just completed. This year 95 per cent. of the coaching of the Juniors was left to one experienced man, Ron Way. Our success in the Branch titles, with six firsts, three seconds and five thirds, indicates the amount of time he has devoted to the boys. But this is not good enough if the boys are to develop into worthwhile senior members. The Juniors need individual coaching in R. and R., march past and water and beach events.
